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SAFETY AND SECURITY ARE EVERYBODY'S RESPONSIBILITY

any South Africans choose to live in residential estates, deeming them safer than stand-alone residences. However, this perception can be misleading as crime statistics escalate and criminals become more brazen and innovative.

One of the most common inhibitors of estate security is complacency on the part of homeowners and residents. Often, the high walls and guarded access points create a false sense of security that results in residents neglecting to take basic steps to secure their homes, such as locking doors, closing windows, installing (and arming!) alarm systems, and ensuring that gardens are illuminated to limit concealment. These are all standard measures for stand-alone homes and should be equally so for homes within estates.

24/7 Security Services urge residents to remain alert as each individual plays a part in combatting crime:

- Do not rely on perimeter security alone. While perimeter security measures have successfully driven down crime in estates, residents must take precautions in their homes.
- Be sure to lock doors and windows and ensure vehicles are locked even when parked in a garage.
- Test alarms and panic buttons regularly.
- Conduct thorough reference checks of domestic workers and gardeners.
- · Report suspicious people, vehicles and behaviour.
- Be alert when entering and exiting the estate.





Vehicle safety tips in public spaces

Incidents of vehicle theft and theft out of vehicles continue to rise. 24/7 Security Services urges vehicle owners to take the necessary precautions when driving and parking in public spaces.

- Avoid parking your vehicle where no security officers or car guards are present.
- Ensure that the doors, windows, and boot are properly closed and locked before you walk away. Always double-check to avoid remote car jamming.
- Close your windows when driving in busy areas.
- Do not open your windows for hawkers along the road or at an intersection.
- When driving, keep the doors locked and the windows closed at all times.
- Avoid displaying anything valuable, such as a handbag, briefcase, watch, cell phone or laptop, in full view on the seats. Instead, lock your valuables in the boot.
- Familiarise yourself with your route before embarking on your trip.
- Always be vigilant and observe your area. If you notice something suspicious when parking your vehicle at a shopping mall, report it to security or the centre management.

Cybersecurity safety: Cell phones

Considering how much we rely on our cell phones and how susceptible they are to attack, you'll want to make sure you are protected:

- Lock your device with a PIN or password and never leave it unprotected in public.
- Only install apps from trusted sources.
- Keep the device's operating system up to date.
- Avoid transmitting or storing personal information on the device.
- Don't click on links or attachments from unsolicited emails or texts.

PROPERTY PULSE EVENT HELD ON 19 FEBRUARY 2025 **SUSTAINABLE LIVING – BOREHOLES AND SOLAR ENERGY FOR THE HOME**

amie Yaldwyn from WATER 365 and Jon Harris from SOLZA delivered a clear and concise presentation, outlining their services and pricing. Both companies bring valuable experience in serving the residents of Fourways Gardens

BOREHOLES: WATER 365 is Johannesburg-based and focused mainly on residential borehole work. They have three specialist teams – drilling, tank and pump installations and filtration. They have invested in innovative technical development with the latest technology, allowing small, powerful drilling rigs into your property, which can fit through a 1.3m space. They have experienced successful drilling in the Fourways Gardens area. No technology can "see" where water is, a good judge is if the area has big trees – there's likely to be water.

The cost of installing a borehole typically ranges from R99,000 to R139,000, depending on the size of the tanks and filtration systems required for household consumption. This includes a smart controller designed to manage and protect the borehole pumps, tanks, pressure vessel valves, and two outlets. There are various types of filtration systems available, including those using pH balancing and reverse osmosis technology, to ensure the provision of potable drinking water for the household.

Q. How much storage do I need?

A. This depends on several family members. Typically, a person consumes 400L per day, therefore, a family of four needs a 2000L tank per day.

Q. How much space do I need for tanks:

A. 1000L tank = 800m (w) x 2195mm (h): 2500L = 1474mm (w) x 1620mm (h): 5000L = 1840mm (w) x 2022mm (h)

Q: How deep is a borehole on average in JHB? A: 40 – 60m

Q: What are the chances of not hitting water? A: 1.8% (our experience)

Q: What is considered a good yield?

A: 5000L – 10 000L per day (24hrs) is considered a good yield (anything above 200L per hour) – Remember boreholes mature over time and generally increase their yield.

SOLAR POWER: SOLZA is based in Northriding and exclusively uses VICTRON energy products.

Their service covers programming and set-up, fault finding and troubleshooting, optimal system performance, on-site repair and ongoing supply and maintenance.

WHY THEY BELIEVE IN TRANSFORMER-BASED INVERTERS:

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Lower Electromagnetic Interference (EMI): These inverters produce less radio frequency noise that interferes with other equipment or sensitive electronic devices nearby.

Longevity and minimal maintenance: They have a longer lifespan than other types of inverters. Robust construction and design, less prone to wear and tear. Minimal maintenance and more reliable.

Prices including installation:

5kva combo R105 000.00 INCLUDING 6 PANELS 8kva combo R145 000.00 INCLUDING 8 PANELS 15kva combo R195 000.00 INCLUDING 12 PANELS

In terms of energy savings (30% - 40%), it's key to run your geyser off the second AC input on a Victron inverter so that it uses excess solar to warm during the day or from Eskom to heat from 4am -5:30am for the morning shower. It will never draw from your battery to heat unless you wish to use some battery power, which can be set up. The other obvious key to saving energy is to use your battery during peak periods and charge from solar the next day. In Fourways Gardens, you must first complete a Solar Registration Form available from the HOA Offices. You will also need:

- A site plan showing the proposed position of panels on the roof and proximity to neighbours.
- Section through panels indicating the angle of panels relative to the roof.
- Electrical layout showing connections to the system.
- Certificate of Compliance from a Registered Electrician.
- Letter from a Government Registered Structural Engineer (Pr.Eng.) confirming the roof is structurally able to take extra load.
- An application fee of R1,375.00.

INDIGENOUS GARDENING: CREATING ECOLOGICAL CORRIDORS AND SUSTAINABLE LANDSCAPES

auteng, South Africa's economic heartland, is often associated with urban sprawl, highways and high-rise buildings. However, amidst the development lies a unique and diverse ecological landscape, home to remnants of the Highveld grasslands, rivers and wetlands. As urbanisation continues to expand, the importance of indigenous gardening has never been greater. By cultivating native plants and creating ecological corridors, we can enhance biodiversity, reduce water consumption and promote sustainable, low-maintenance gardens.

The importance of indigenous gardening

Indigenous plants are naturally adapted to Gauteng's climate, soil conditions and seasonal rainfall patterns. Unlike exotic species, which often require additional watering and fertilisation, indigenous plants thrive with minimal intervention. This makes them ideal for home gardens, parks and public spaces, particularly in a water-scarce country like South Africa.

Creating ecological corridors

One of the most powerful benefits of indigenous gardening is the creation of ecological corridors – connected green spaces that allow wildlife to move freely between habitats. Gauteng's rapid urban expansion has fragmented natural landscapes, making it difficult for birds, insects and small mammals to find food, shelter and breeding grounds. By incorporating indigenous plants into our gardens, we can create a network of green spaces that supports local wildlife and promotes ecological resilience.

Working with natural features

Understanding and using Gauteng's natural features can significantly enhance the effectiveness of an indigenous garden.

- The province's landscape is characterised by:
- Highveld grasslands: These open, grassy areas support a rich diversity of wildflowers, birds and pollinators. Planting species such as red hot pokers (Kniphofia uvaria), wild iris (Dietes





grandiflora), and African daisies (*Arctotis* spp.) can help restore these ecosystems.

- Rocky outcrops and ridges: Gauteng has many rocky areas that are home to resilient plant species like aloes (*Aloe* spp.), wild olives (*Olea europaea* subsp. *africana*), and spekboom (*Portulacaria afra*). These plants are not only drought-tolerant but also provide food and shelter for wildlife.
- Wetlands and rivers: Natural water sources attract birds, amphibians and aquatic insects. Indigenous reeds, bulrushes (*Typha capensis*), and wild figs (*Ficus sur*) help to stabilise wetland areas and improve water quality.

Boosting biodiversity

Indigenous gardens serve as miniecosystems, supporting a diverse range of species. By planting a variety of native flora, you can attract pollinators such as bees and butterflies, insect-eating birds like wagtails and sunbirds, and small mammals such as hedgehogs.

Key ways to boost biodiversity include:


- Planting layered vegetation: Using a mix of groundcovers, shrubs and trees mimics natural habitats and provides shelter and food for different species.
- Leaving natural mulch and deadwood:

Fallen leaves, twigs and logs create microhabitats for insects and fungi, which are crucial for healthy soil.

• Avoiding pesticides and herbicides: These chemicals harm beneficial insects and disrupt the food chain. Instead, encourage natural predators like ladybugs and praying mantises to control pests.

Reduced watering and maintenance

One of the greatest advantages of indigenous gardening is its low water and maintenance requirements. Since these plants have evolved to survive in Gauteng's climate, they require far less water than exotic species.



Some key strategies for a water-wise garden include:

- Using drought-resistant plants: Species like wild garlic (*Tulbaghia violacea*), silver trees (*Leucadendron argenteum*), and agapanthus (*Agapanthus* spp.) thrive with minimal watering.
- **Mulching:** Applying a thick layer of organic mulch around plants reduces water evaporation, suppresses weeds and enriches the soil.
- Rainwater harvesting: Collecting rainwater in tanks or using permeable paving helps reduce reliance on municipal water supplies.

Conclusion

Indigenous gardening in Gauteng is more than just a landscaping trend – it's a commitment to sustainability, conservation and biodiversity. By embracing local plants, working with natural features and creating ecological corridors, we can transform our urban spaces into thriving natural sanctuaries.

Whether you have a small balcony or a large garden, every indigenous plant contributes to a greener, more resilient future for Gauteng's environment and its inhabitants.

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
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
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IS YOUR PET EXPERIENCING SILENT PAIN?

opefully, in today's world, people recognise that animals are sentient beings. They experience emotions, just like us, and although they do not possess the same cognitive abilities, they are able to feel (amongst others) happiness, playfulness, sadness, fear, grief, pain and terror. Although they cannot speak, we often can tell from the animal's body language as to what emotion the animal is feeling and how they interact with others.

We all recognise when animals play and get the zoomies. What we are not good at, however, is noticing when our companion animal is in pain. Sure, we can pick up on the obvious: the active dog no longer wants to go for a walk and is limping, and the once ravenous cat is no longer interested in food or play. We can observe these types of behavioural changes, which are clues as to what the animal may be feeling. We can see something is wrong, so we schedule an appointment with the veterinarian. Again, what we are not good at is recognising when our animals are in pain. Statistics have shown that nearly half the world's dogs and cats (450 million dogs and 300 million cats) are suffering in silent pain. That's an awful lot of animals. Our pets may still wag their tails and come running up to greet us on arrival home whilst experiencing silent pain.

A veterinarian who gave an extensive talk on this subject mentioned that he was playing with his dog, Mitzi, when he felt his dog's muscles tighten when his hand went near the neck area. When he discussed this



observation with his wife, she mentioned that four weeks previously she had seen Mitzi lose his step and fall down the stairs. She assumed that the dog was fine as he just shook himself and carried on, business as usual. No one had realised that Mitzi had injured himself as the behaviour of the dog had not changed. The veterinarian had been practising for over two decades and had not noticed that Mitzi was suffering in silence.

Often, when pets go to groomers, we drop them off and pick them up. We don't know what happens during their time there, behind the scenes. The calm dog or cat that went off in the morning may come home reactive and "not themselves". If this goes on for a while, then they may be experiencing silent pain without us ever realising it. Even if the animal looks physically fine, there is a good chance that he is suffering in silent pain. Feel your pet's body gently but firmly, section by section if you suspect this may be the case. He will let you know when you hit the spot. Therapeutic touch works wonders.
