MEET THE CHEF WARREN DRY

Executive Chef at Moo Moo, Mall of Africa

e introduce the gourmet king of steak, Warren Dry, as part of our Meet the Chef series. He's the executive chef of Moo Moo at Mall of Africa. Come Meet & Whine at Moo Moo, the specialists in steak, burgers and ribs.

Q: What is the main cuisine at Moo Moo?

A: We are primarily a steakhouse that is strongly influenced by proudly South African flavours.

Q: When did you decide to become a chef, and why?

A: I've had a passion for food and food experimentation from a very young age. I had great inspiration from my grandfather, who nurtured my skills from childhood. It brings me joy when people love food that I've prepared.

Q: What qualifications do you hold?

A: I did my City and Guilds Chefs Diploma at Chefs Training & Innovation Academy.

Q: What is your cooking style?

A: I prefer the Mediterranean style of cooking. It's simple and draws its flavours from fresh, quality herbs and ingredients. I also enjoy experimenting with Asian flavours.

Q: What is your inspiration for new recipes and dishes?

A: I like bringing flavours from different styles together to create something unique. I also like the challenge of updating classic recipes by incorporating modern elements.

Q: What is your favourite dish to prepare on your current menu and why?

A: Making the Moo Moo infused butters. I slow-roast the onions and marrow bones that come straight out of our butchery. The bacon is fried and fresh herbs chopped. It is all then slowly infused into the butter to make the various infused butter flavours that customers can add to their steaks.

Q: What is your favourite home-cooked meal?

A: A classic paneer butter masala with naan bread, inspired by my wife's Indian heritage. Another firm favourite is slow roasted lamb and potatoes prepared in the pizza oven.

Q: In your opinion, what is the most underrated ingredient and why?

A: I'd have to pick two as they go hand-inhand. Coriander and cumin. They bring out the flavour of vegetables and meat alike in ways that other ingredients can't.

Q: If you could cook with only three ingredients, what would they be?

A: Lamb, garlic and tomatoes.

Q: What is one kitchen tool or appliance you cannot function without?

A: Definitely a good, sharp knife.

Q: If money were no object, what kitchen appliances would you invest in?

A: A Rational oven, a stick blender and a blast chiller are some of my favourite kitchen appliances.

Q: Who is your chef idol, and why?

A: Gordon Ramsay. He is a Michelin-star chef who has a unique understanding of food. I admire how he strives for perfection and doesn't believe in shortcuts, but rather in doing things the right way.

Q: If you could prepare a meal for one celebrity, who would it be and what would you serve?

A: Lucas Radebe. I would prepare fire-roasted loin lamb chops with tzatziki, with cumin- and coriander-roasted butternut on the side.



Q: What do you think of cooking shows? Do you have a favourite?

A: Cooking shows are great. They help people see and understand what goes into preparing a truly amazing dish. They are also good for picking up new trends, tips and tricks. I would say my favourite show is *Kitchen Nightmares*.

Q: What's your favourite South African dish to eat?

A: A hot and spicy bunny chow served with sambals.

Q: What will we always find in your fridge?

A: A good amount of garlic and a homemade chilli sauce.

Q: If you could choose your last meal, what would it be?

A: The How Cheesy Burger on the Moo Moo menu is one of my all-time favourites. It's simplicity lets you really enjoy the rich, umami flavour of the patty, topped with melted cheese and our creamy cheese sauce. Plus, the pickles and onions add that extra crunch and texture that I love.

Q. What fast food is your secret indulgence?

A: A good wood-fired pizza on a thin crust.

Q: Are you pro or anti air fryers?

A: I have mixed feelings about air fryers. They can be great for certain items, but are not always conducive to better-tasting food.

Q: If you weren't a chef, what would you be?

A: I would probably have followed my other passion, which is working with motorbikes.

Q: Any interesting career anecdote you would like to share?

A: Being a chef has taught me the value of long hours and hard work. It has taught me to be prepared for any situation I may face and has nurtured relationships with my team that I value dearly. It is definitely not for the fainthearted but is highly rewarding.

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WATERFALL CITY AT YOUR SERVICE

uilding a safe, sustainable smart city like Waterfall City is no small feat. Ensuring that our City delivers on its promise of being a place where one can integrate every aspect of life seamlessly, as part of a flourishing community, takes careful planning and dedication. Future-proofed infrastructure, technology, safety, sustainability, education and accessibility are just some of the key components in this regard.

While all these aspects have been mapped out meticulously at Waterfall City, the development takes things one step further by placing a strong focus on offering its community a host of dedicated services.

Maintenance, security, landscaping, medical care and fire prevention – these are Waterfall City's dedicated services, making it truly unique.

Maintenance

At Waterfall City, maintenance is a key priority. We ensure that every day, common services run effectively. We support the City's vision of being a smart city that is so admired, no one

could imagine a better place in which to live, work, play and prosper.

Aspects such as litter picking, common area high-level landscaping, broader Waterfall City cleaning, the planting or replacing of bollards, pothole repairs, grass cutting, road sweeping, street-light maintenance, wayfinding and landscaping common areas are just some of the key maintenance priorities seen to by various teams and role players on a regular basis. The development has also taken on the challenge of keeping the Juskei River clean for Waterfall City's citizens to enjoy. In total, 6.24km of the river runs through Waterfall City and due to heavy rains and urban run-off, fighting litter in the river is a massive yet important job.

It is this work behind the scenes that keeps a place as complex as Waterfall City running smoothly.

Did you know? Waterfall City residents and businesses are able to assist in pointing out maintenance matters that need attention in the City. You can report a crime, a broken streetlamp or a down-and-out traffic light on the Go Waterfall app.











Security

Safety is not just a key focus at Waterfall City, it is one of its main pillars. By employing the latest security technologies, along with tactical response teams, Waterfall City aims to provide a luxury money cannot buy: peace of mind.

Safety and security are prime drivers behind estate living, and Waterfall City continues to focus on creating what can be considered a 'criminally unfriendly' area to ensure that the development is as safe as possible not only for its residents, but also for everyone working here.

With a fully integrated security system that includes access control at every residential estate, business park, major retail centre and logistics precinct, as well as a 24/7 surveillance and reaction service on our roads, all supported by a state-of-the-art central management office, it's clear that Waterfall City takes its safety procedures seriously.

Additional measures include 24-hour patrolled security and CCTV cameras

throughout Waterfall City, as well as 134 surveillance cameras with number plate and facial recognition abilities. In the CBD, 400 cameras, panic buttons every 200m and street lighting on backup power ensure peace of mind for everyone.

The idea is to focus on the prevention of crime rather than on investigation after perpetration. Keeping Waterfall City safe is a critical focus.

Did you know? Waterfall City Security currently reads more than six million vehicle number plates a month. From these reads, it receives more than 500 alerts a month, which typically include vehicles that are involved in a police investigation, form part of the crime database, or are flagged for driving recklessly (for example, speeding) within Waterfall City. In an emergency, residents of Waterfall City can use the Emergency Contacts feature on the Go Waterfall App to call the relevant estate's security control room. Waterfall City will soon have a 24-hour security number for the entire precinct.

Landscaping and Water Management

Landscaping, water filtration/treatment and water protection are also some of the key common services Waterfall City pays careful attention to.

Flooding and erosion control are significant challenges when it comes to stormwater management in any development. One of the ways in which Waterfall City has mitigated this is by building nine attenuation dams that have become part of its 130ha greenbelt. There is a large attenuation dam within the Waterfall Country Village Estate and there are 17 smaller ones across the rest of the development. These carefully designed civil structures blend into the natural landscape and play a critical role in controlling the flow of rainwater throughout the development.

In addition, a number of specific species of fish have been introduced to the main dam to support the natural process of keeping it healthy and creating a thriving ecosystem.

Furthermore, Waterfall City has a water-use licence that allows for the irrigation of common areas of the development using water from the Jukskei River. Dirty river water is pumped into an ozone water treatment plant and used for irrigation and water features in public spaces. On a busy day, the plant treats approximately two million litres of water.

Over and above this, as part of the development's wider sustainability efforts, residents are encouraged to install JoJo tanks, using their gutters for harvesting rainwater.

To conserve water, Waterfall City's landscaping focuses on indigenous, water-wise plants. There is also a focus on dry landscaping. This includes the removal of alien plant species and the planting of indigenous plants and a variety of grasses, specifically Highland grasses. This type of planting requires minimal water and saves on power, which is needed to pump water.

Did you know? Waterfall City's irrigation plant massively decreases the E. coli count in the water. This water is used for landscaping and then finds itself back in the Juskei River much cleaner than it was before.

Medical care

As the name would suggest, the Netcare Waterfall City Hospital is our local on-site healthcare facility, ensuring immediate access to world-class medical attention. It is a state-of-the-art, 200-bed private hospital, committed to quality patient care. The 24-hour emergency service and the more than 60 on-site specialists have got you and your health covered.

The facility also boasts an internationally accredited bariatric surgery centre and da Vinci robotic-assisted surgery for the treatment of prostate, bladder and kidney cancers. The hospital has been planned with the future in mind and can be expanded to accommodate up to 300 beds.

The hospital also has a dedicated Waterfall City Netcare 911 emergency medical service for Waterfall City citizens – you can reach it by dialling 010 209 8365.

Experienced staff in Netcare 911's national emergency operations centre (EOC) engage with callers and dispatch emergency medical personnel to provide the assistance required timeously. Services that extend beyond emergency medical services (EMS) resource dispatch, include telephonic and live video conferencing cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) coaching.

This process allows trained and versatile team members to video conference with the callers directly while performing CPR on mannequins in the call centre, enabling them to copy the steps for this critical lifesaving intervention.

Netcare 911 also has a 'Locate Me' function for when you do not know where you are. Irrespective of location, an SMS link will be sent to you, allowing the team to track your GPS coordinates and find you.

Did you know? Netcare has a fleet of medivac (medical evacuation) helicopters based at the Ultimate Heliport in Waterfall City.





Fire prevention

Fire Ops SA opened its sixth fire station in Johannesburg in Waterfall City in 2022, bringing much-needed peace of mind for all citizens. In case of emergencies, the private fire brigade offers a full firefighting service with a highly skilled team of officers and firefighters. The brigade has rapid intervention vehicles (RIV) and traditional pumpers, and the team is available 24-hours a day.

Fire Ops SA covers the entire 2,200ha Waterfall City development and nearby surrounds. The team is fully equipped to attend to any fire emergencies, motor vehicle accidents and even water rescues across residential and commercial properties.

Reporting a fire is easy. Simply call 083 622 6026. This number is also listed on the Go Waterfall app under 'emergency contacts'.

Did you know? You can download the Fire Ops SA app from the Apple App Store or Google Play. Just search for the Fire Operations Activator app. By



reporting a fire via the app, Fire Ops will automatically obtain your exact location, saving precious time. In either case, Fire Ops will appear on the site of a reported emergency in Waterfall City within seven minutes.

Waterfall City is a city of connection, commerce, community and care and its dedicated services play a key role in maintaining these cornerstones. While these fundamentals have always been integral to Waterfall City's offerings, articulated in a brand strategy, they now underpin a common set of values and ambitions for the community. As a result, Waterfall City has positioned itself as a mindful partner in Gauteng's residential and commercial ecosystem.



ATTACQ CONTINUES TO DELIVER



ttacq Limited ("Attacq"), the JSE-listed real estate investment trust (REIT) and strategic development partner in Waterfall City, recently announced a robust set of results for the full-year ended 30 June 2023. The company reported full-year dividend growth of 16.0% to 58.0 cents per share, with distributable income per share increasing by 14.5% to 71.9 cents.

Operationally, Attacq performed strongly, with both occupancy and

collection rates remaining high at 92.5% and 100.7% respectively, as the Group continues to experience record trading density, further delivering against its proven multi-hub strategy. Positive retail trade in Mall of Africa resulted in a 10.8% growth in rental income for the year supported by 21 new brands being introduced. This resulted in a 91.6% increase in turnover rental and a 71.4% increase in third party income at Mall of Africa, which is becoming a preferred destination for exhibitions and advertising.

Jackie van Niekerk, CEO of Attacq, says: "This year has been transformative for Attacq on so many fronts – from building and growing community partnerships to presenting and delivering a landmark equity transaction with our partners at the GEPF, and achieving key environmental, social and governance (ESG) milestones. As a purpose-led business, we think differently about real estate, and this is evident in the successful execution of our strategy this year."

Attacq's unique South African precinct-focused portfolio is diversified across different asset classes and geographies. Several key development highlights over the past year included the increased density at the Plumblink head office and distribution centre, as well as the completion of Phase 2 of Ellipse Waterfall, the award-winning luxurious residential development in the heart of Waterfall City, contributing an additional 30,586m² of gross leasable area.

Raj Nana, CFO of Attacq, says: "Our balance sheet remains strong, and we are particularly pleased that post the implementation of the GEPF transaction, the Group's loan-to-value (LTV) will reduce to 26%. Our dividend-per-share growth of 16.0% is a considerable achievement in the current environment."

A growth-focused portfolio

Waterfall City, the Group's flagship retail, residential, logistics and office precinct, continues to perform well against all metrics, and bears testament to the

success of Attacq's precinct-focused strategy. The ability to roll out reliable infrastructure has assisted in mitigating local government service delivery challenges, and the City has continued to attract local and global blue-chip industrial and office tenants, including Cisco, Sage, Cotton On, Vantage Data Centers, Dimension Data, Accenture, Pfizer, Cummins and Dis-Chem.

In addition, Attacq is in the process of increasing its investment in Waterfall Junction from 23.57% to 50.0%. This will soon be launched for top-structure development on the completion of servicing phase 1 (total size: 156,000m² of bulk).

A leading ESG-focused REIT

Attacq's ESG initiatives remain best in class with a special focus during the year on energy, water and waste management. The Group's recently launched Attacq Energy initiative aims to design and implement costeffective, off-grid and sustainable energy resources to achieve its target of increasing its renewable energy consumption to more than 25% of the total consumption of the energy mix.

The Group also launched its proactive water management plan focused on improving water efficiencies and consumption, thereby reducing the cost of occupancy.

"I am exceptionally proud that all Attacq's properties can operate during load-shedding. Our team has displayed resilience throughout the year and is reflective of the inclusive, community and stakeholder-led approach we have fostered internally and externally," concludes Van Niekerk.

THE FUTURE OF HEALTHCARE

Pioneering electronic medical records system 'a game changer' for Netcare hospitals

he power of digital technology to improve health and care for patients is being felt at Netcare Waterfall City Hospital. This is thanks to the recent implementation of a pioneering electronic medical record system that is being adopted at Netcare facilities.

"Very few hospitals in the world have the capability for specialists and healthcare teams to view patients' clinical information, test results and vital observations remotely in real time," says Jacques du Plessis, managing director of Netcare's hospital division.

"Netcare is the first private healthcare provider in South Africa to have invested in developing a state-of-the-art electronic medical record system."

All documentation and management of patient records are done electronically. Now, the ordering of tests conducted by pathology laboratories, radiology and the blood bank – as well as the receiving of results – are electronic, and the information acquired feeds directly into the mobile platform.

In addition, the hospital is delighted to confirm the digital integration of its medical equipment and devices in its intensive care units (ICUs) and theatres.

"Already, the electronic medical records system has become a game changer in our hospital as it automatically records patients' clinically relevant data on their unique electronic medical record," says Jaco du Preez, general manager of Netcare Waterfall City Hospital.

"Through the secure platform, the treating specialists, nurses and other healthcare practitioners involved in a patient's care can access and check each of their patients' current condition, as well as medical notes and additional context. They can do so by logging on to a mobile device at any time and from any location."

Having access to the most comprehensive and up-to-date information at their fingertips at all times has the important benefit of informing clinical decision-making in real time. This technology also makes it easier for practitioners to collaborate: it enables multidisciplinary teams to work together as they have access to all relevant patient information.

Up-to-date, accurate information allows for a more personalised and efficient treatment, informed by treatment protocols, to achieve the best possible outcome for each patient.



"A key operational advantage of the new digital system is that doctors and nurses are no longer having to capture all information manually on a patient's file. They can focus on the clinical and nursing aspects, and on enhancing the personalised care provided to each patient," says Du Plessis.

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FAMILY TRUSTS

Effective financial planning tools, despite stricter tax controls

espite having fallen out of favour in recent years due to the implementation of stricter measures to prevent tax avoidance, trusts are still one of the most effective estate planning tools for families – even more so when you take family pricing into consideration.

A trust is a legal structure set up by a founder into which assets are transferred and administered by trustees for the benefit of one or more beneficiaries. The assets are administered in accordance with a trust deed (in the case of an *inter vivos* trust) or the deceased's will (in the case of a testamentary trust).

Some of the ways in which your family can benefit from including a trust in their estate plan are explored below.

Estate pegging

Estate pegging involves transferring assets from an individual's estate into a trust via a loan account. The benefit of this in family financial planning is that whilst the loan account will remain an asset in the estate of the deceased family member, growth on the asset will be allocated to the trust, thereby limiting future executor's fees and estate taxes payable by the estate of the deceased family member.

A trust does not die

When a family member who is a



trustee passes away, the assets in the trust are not frozen while the deceased trustee's estate is being wound up (as would be the case with assets in their personal estate). Beneficiaries of the trust who are dependent on the trust for income payments would therefore continue to receive these payments to cover their living expenses without interruption or delay.

Unlike family assets in the name of an individual, family assets in the name of a trust don't change hands intergenerationally from one personal estate to the other, so no estate or transfer fees and taxes are payable in respect of these assets.

Protection of assets

Since the assets of a trust are held in the name of the trustees, they are

protected against the creditors of the founder, trustees and beneficiaries (who are separate legal entities to the trust). Keeping assets in a trust on behalf of a minor beneficiary or a family member with special needs is another form of protection – particularly if the family is concerned about a minor's legal guardian or are worried that a dependent family member with special needs will be taken advantage of should the trust founder pass away.


Tax efficiency

Income accruing to a trust is currently taxed at a rate of 45%, and capital gains accruing to the trust are currently taxed at an effective rate of 36%, which are both higher than the respective rates applicable to individuals. However, by allocating the income or capital gains to the

respective beneficiaries via what is known as the "conduit principle", it will be taxed at the beneficiaries' marginal tax rates, which is a benefit if the recipients of the income are taxed at lower marginal rates.

Different families have differing financial planning needs

Family financial plans are dependent on the needs of the family, so it is important to seek advice that is relevant to your specific situation. For example, a young family is less likely to have accumulated assets substantial enough to consider a trust, and their family's priorities may be better addressed with long-term insurance solutions or retirement savings. Speak to your financial adviser about what is suitable for your family's needs.

Q: How were you introduced to bronze sculptures?



Their works didn't just look real; they felt alive, almost as if their subjects could spring into motion at any moment.

Q: How did the realism and detail in Steynberg and Roos's works affect you?

A: Beyond the realism, what struck me was the lasting nature of their art. Bronze doesn't fade or change over time. It preserves the beauty and essence of these sculptures for generations to enjoy.

Q: Is this why you choose to sculpt in bronze?

A: Yes. I love the way bronze pieces stand the test of time. Unlike drawings or clay models, bronze sculptures don't fade or change over time. They keep their beauty for many years.











Q: How does this project differ from your previous works?

A: The San people are famous for their respectful ways of hunting. It's an honour to represent this in my art. I'm taking extra care to study and understand their hunting practices to portray this figure accurately and respectfully. This sculpture is not just a piece of art; its a tribute to the hunting tradition of the San people. I think my fans

will look forward to this unique and meaningful piece of art.

We look forward to seeing more of Bernie's sculptures that echo the spirit and rough beauty of Africa's wilderness – not just for today, but for generations to come. In Bernie's latest project that pays tribute to the Khoisan, we are again reminded of how he strives to bring

stories to life through his works. They reflect the artist's deep appreciation for nature and indigenous cultures.

Remember: It is a fallacy that birds and other animals reject their young if they have acquired a human scent. This denies animal parents' innate drive to nurture their broods and it ignores a bird's basic biology. In fact, birds have a particularly poor sense of smell and it's much better to try to reunite the family as soon as possible.

Step 2: If the bird or baby mammal cannot be reunited with their parent or family, Free Wildlife will care for and rehabilitate the animal until it's time to release it.

Step 3: Releases are carefully planned and, where possible, animals are released back to a familiar/ territorial area.

Releasing animals that have been in our care is always a joyful time.





















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THE BRAT FACTOR

No one wants to raise a spoilt child. Would you know if your child is a brat?

here are several ways the latest generation of kids stands out. They are more technologically driven and appear to be interested in materialism – even young children have bought into the renewed focus on image and appearance.

Following in mom and dad's proverbial footsteps, they ask to wear Nikes, not just takkies. How cute is it to see a two-year-old branding 'Just Do It' footwear? However, when your rapidly growing pre-teen is used to being spoilt this way, it becomes an expensive exercise. Requests soon change to demands. The result? No one wants to be seen in public with an angry child as it tarnishes a carefully constructed public image.

When parents have minimal authority and children continually get their own way by acting out, the children become spoilt. But contrary to popular belief, children aren't spoilt because they whine; they are spoilt if whining consistently gets them what they want. Sometimes, in an effort to be kinder, gentler parents, moms and dads let their sweet little darlings get the upper hand. It is time for the pendulum to swing. You can be gentle and still afford your children the opportunity to grow into responsible, contributing members of society.

How to identify a spoilt brat

You may ask whether your children are spoilt. If they show any of the following patterns of behaviour after the age of two or three (according to www.pediatrics.about.com), they may have difficulty with discipline and may, indeed, be spoilt:

- They have frequent temper tantrums, make demands and cannot accept it when things do not go their way
- They get frustrated easily, fight, protest and say "no" to most requests
- They have difficulty following rules or do not respond to limits set by caregivers
- They frequently attempt to control other children and adults, and have trouble sharing or even playing with other children because of bossiness
- They have difficulty discerning between their needs and wants, and have little respect for the needs and wants of others
- They become bored easily, show very little patience and tend to express anger physically by hitting, biting or yelling
- They cause you, the parent, to avoid public places and to always have bribes ready
- They act up even when you're engaging in something, so you have difficulty finishing a story, a telephone conversation or a task

If these behaviour patterns sound familiar, you can consider your child or children to be spoilt.

Spoilt children are not happy children. They don't learn to handle disappointment and often negate their own role in a situation. They find it difficult to adjust to the demands of their environment and will keep on seeking extrinsic motivation for tasks that have to be performed. When asked how she motivates herself to study, a teenager responded in this flippant way: "I don't. My parents buy me stuff and give me money."

One must understand intrinsic versus extrinsic motivation. Intrinsic motivation is when people do things because they feel proud of themselves when they do them. They have a sense of accomplishment and achievement. Extrinsic motivation is when someone does something because of external motivation – for example, they will receive money, a toy or a privilege if they do the task.

If you always reward your children with material things, they will never learn how to motivate themselves with internal rewards such as taking pride in what they accomplish. And they will never learn to value things because there are so many rewards, and nothing is special.

THE MOST IMPORTANT BUILDING BLOCKS OF PARENTHOOD

- 1. Unconditional love children need to know they are intrinsically okay and good enough, and that they do not have to perform for you to accept them unconditionally.
- 2. Consistency children flourish when there are routines. If life (and discipline) is predictable, they can work out how to control their part in it and learn to take responsibility. In this way, they develop a sense of self-esteem.
- 3. Availability children thrive on knowing they can count on you to be there, whether it is to listen, help, support or just be a witness to their accomplishments. By giving of your time, you will create an environment conducive to conversation and shared experiences.

Traditionally, discipline is used as a negative consequence or a discouragement to correct undesirable behaviour. This equates discipline with punishment and excludes a crucial part of the formula – reward. The parental team (mother, father and/or caregiver) should agree that punishment must always be age-appropriate, and the rule of thumb is consistency. This teaches children about consequences and to think before they act.

It is never acceptable to physically punish a child when you are angry – this models undesirable behaviour. Ideal behaviour, not the patterns of behaviour listed earlier in the article, should be rewarded consistently.

The rewards should not be material in nature. Rather, they should consist of positive verbal responses such as "well done", "great job" or "way to go". You can also reward them with a special

activity that they enjoy, such as baking cupcakes on Saturday, going fishing at the lake or visiting friends. This should not be held as a condition, but if you can give your child a goal to work towards, it can act as a strong motivator.

WHAT CAN I DO TO REVERSE THE EFFECTS?

- 1. Make sure your children aren't defining their happiness and their status in the world as a function of what they wear or drive. Sit down with them and have a one-on-one conversation about what really defines their worth their intelligence, their creativity, being caring, being giving, their work ethic, etc.
- 2. Make sure your child understands the value of hard work. The difference between winners and losers is that winners do things losers don't want to do they work hard to get ready to be a star! Help your children set goals. Teach them that striving to own nice things is fine if they understand how much hard work it takes to be able to afford them.
- 3. Your children do not have to love you every minute of the day. They'll get over the disappointment of having been told "no". But they won't get over the effects of being spoilt.
- 4. Set age-appropriate boundaries so that children go after life exuberantly, testing the limits. You can start during the toddler years.
- 5. Be consistent. Always do what you say you're going to do. If you tell your children a particular behaviour will have consequences, they should know you mean it. "This time I'm really taking the toy away if you don't play nicely" doesn't work when you've already said it 10 times. Reinforce positive behaviour more than you harp on about negative behaviour and show your approval when they say "please" and "thank you" and when they play gently with friends.
- 6. Talk openly about acceptable behaviour as they get older. School-







age and adolescent children are capable of insight, so sit down and try to work out problems together. For example, if you ask a child "Why are you doing this?", the child may not be able to tell you. But if you say, "I wonder why this keeps happening", that open-ended question may give the child room to speculate. You may be surprised by what you learn.

- 7. Stay calm. Losing your temper over bad behaviour only makes you feel bad and look out of control (similar to a spoilt child), and it doesn't teach the child to behave any better in fact, the child may well follow your bad-tempered examples later in life.
- 8. A child out of control is a cry for help, not a sign that the child is spoilt.

 Best to start early and set limits consistently, and to understand the developmental needs of the infant

- and young child to find this delicate, critical balance between freedom and limits.
- 9. Don't let your guilt get in the way of your parenting. Your job as a parent is to prepare your children to succeed in school and prepare them for when they go out into the world. You don't want to teach your children that they will get everything through manipulation, pouting, crying, door-slamming and guilt induction.

Here's a pertinent question: If you want your children to help clean up, how do you get them to do it? You say, "We need to get four things done. Which do you choose?" Start by doing it together, then gradually fade out of the picture. Praise your children as they do more.

Often, when parents decide to reverse the tide, they focus too much on "no" and on punishment. But it isn't about cracking down; it's about creating a value system that enables your child to learn life skills. Remember: the shock of changing everything means we change nothing, so take it slowly. You have to make slow, progressive changes to get it right.

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
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

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
THE WOMAN AT THE WHEEL By Penny Haw


