MATURE OLYMPICS 2024

t the Waterfall Mature Lifestyle Estates (Waterfall Hills and Waterfall Valley), there has been no need to wait for the Paris 2024 Olympics in July-August this year, as these estates have hosted their very own during April and May, showing everyone how important it is to engage in an active lifestyle and foster a community of care when retiring.

The making of the games

The Mature Olympics 2024 is the brainchild of Pam Fletcher, an Ex-Physical Education (PE) teacher who lives at Waterfall Hills Mature Lifestyle Estate. Alongside Linda Evans from Waterfall Hills, Ronelle Baker, Events Co-ordinator at Waterfall Valley and a very able team of around 50 dedicated individuals, they created their own Olympic Games for the Mature Lifestyle Estates in Waterfall City. Pam's vision was to re-ignite friendships, skills, and cross-estate interaction.

"We always wanted the two estates to work more closely together to get people out of their homes and socialising. The thinking was that one may have once upon a time enjoyed a certain physical activity, and there are likely some enthusiastic sportspersons among us keen to show off their talents. We also wanted to create great spectatorship opportunities, especially for those not partaking, and showcase our estates' amazing facilities."

The action kicked off in April, and an admin team was appointed to plan the opening ceremony. According to Linda, many questions arose.

"What is the history of the Olympic Flame, and how would we symbolically replicate it, with Olympia being the birthplace, then carried to The Games? How would one carry a lit torch from the Waterfall Valley Mature Lifestyle Estate through the streets of Waterfall City to Waterfall Hills? Was permission required or, heaven forbid, a police escort needed? Do we have a willing Torch Bearer to run the route? More importantly, how do we re-enact the tradition with authenticity and in compliance with health and safety regulations, yet realistic enough to interest our residents?"

Several meetings, ideas and collaboration with various residents and Waterfall City Management brought it together. As a result, the Mature Olympics 2024 kicked off with a mini opening ceremony at Waterfall Valley, where Greece was represented by resident Ekaterini Baumann Markaki, dressed in national colours and an olive wreath crown, who handed

over the 'flame' to Torch Bearer and resident Brenda Fitzgerald, a former world champion speed walker.

Willie Vos, CEO of Waterfall City Management Company, surprised everyone by arranging for Fidelity Guards' Tactical Unit to ensure safe passage up Waterfall Drive. Flashing lights followed the athletes and Torch Bearers, helping them navigate traffic and cross the busy Waterfall/Woodmead Drive intersection up to the Waterfall Hills Manor House.

"It brought a lump to one's throat to see the number of Mature Lifestyle Estate residents who came out to wish the Torch Bearers a safe journey whilst the music of Chariots of Fire rang out over the Waterfall Valley lawns. Groups gathered along the Boulevard of Waterfall Hills, waiting on the bridges and at the Manor House, where Willie gave a wonderful speech."

The Olympic Flame was ignited, and the Mature Olympic Games were declared "officially open".

Game on

Twenty-five games were organised, offering an exciting variety of activities catering to different interests and fitness levels. Some groups exceeded expectations, with the final participation number reaching the 650 mark.

The walking team leaders took on four different events: a Woodlands Park Run 5km timed race, a frosty 2.5km walk around the Hills for the estate strollers, the 10km River Walk and the 1km Assisted Walk.

"Total Care, the frail care centre at the Waterfall Hills Mature Lifestyle Estate, was committed to ensuring their frail care 'Olympians' contributed to The Games. The staff sang the national anthem, dressed in national or sports gear, carried flags, and provided water stations during the Assisted Walk. Support came from all avenues, including Paramedic Jenny Bryson and Fidelity Guard Jabulani Mkansi.

Outdoor aerobics was held on the Valley Estate lawn outside the clubhouse, which had a great sound system. Aerobics instructor Olivier Leclaire put everyone through their paces with synchronised movements.

"The golfers 'pitching, chipping, bunker shots and putting' required some recruiting and alluring promises of the benefit of the 19th hole," laughs Linda. The course was prepped and made ready courtesy of Southern Turf Management, who upgraded the flags and hole liners and cut new holes for the greens.

Alongside the active games, including bowls, gym, swimming, Zumba, croquet and table tennis, there were also mental challenges, such as canasta, bridge, and chess tournaments. Boules was even played for the first time in many years – an event led by Una Rolands, who says she studied the rules and decided to 'give it a go'. The Waterfall Bird Club also held three events, including a walk along the Jukskei River.



"What was impressive is how the true spirit of the Olympics was taken up by our residents," says Pam. "The principles of Olympism are Excellence, Respect and Friendship. I always stressed that the aim and objective of the event was not to win and be the best at everything but to get out of the comfort zone that you may be in. Challenge yourself, support others, learn something new, and enjoy life to the best of your ability right now."

All the game hosts managed their events well over the two months, going the extra mile to ensure an enjoyable and successful time for participants. No less than 650 medals were handed out over the 25 activities. "Everyone loves being a winner, especially for a Geldhof handmade Belgian chocolate medal," smiles Linda.

A gala dinner was held on 7 June to close the Mature Olympics 2024 and recognise the contributions and success of everyone involved in making it a memorable and triumphant celebration of active aging.

Baron Pierre de Coubertin, the founder of the modern Olympics, once said: "The most important thing in the Olympic Games is not winning but taking part; the essential thing in life is not conquering but fighting well."

The Waterfall City Mature Olympics 2024 not only proved that athleticism and enthusiasm is well and truly alive in the senior residents at Waterfall Hills and Waterfall Valley, but it also highlighted the strong community spirit and the importance of staying active and engaged at any age.

Fun facts

The oldest participant – 98-year-old Tony Dinham, entered for swimming.

Most active – Lilith Wynne participated in eight physical events at 86.

The biggest drawcard event was the social bridge with 76 participants, followed by a lavish tea.

The most emotional event was the 1km Assisted Walk, during which 44 medals were handed out to frail care and mobility-challenged participants and their carers.





WATERFALL CITY FIELD GUIDE **UPDATE 2024**




he Waterfall City Field Guide, published in May 2023, is a limited edition, 170-page publication, which details the history of Waterfall City, its location, topography, climate, ecology and geology. It also lists and illustrates all the indigenous trees and shrubs, mushrooms and fungi, wildflowers, grasses, birdlife and wildlife, fish, insects and more, alongside a foldout map of the green belt areas. In short, it's the definitive guide to the natural wonders of Waterfall City and a fantastic legacy for its creators six proud Waterfall City residents.


When the Waterfall City Field Guide was published, it was agreed that an annual update would be made available in digital format when additional species of wildlife were identified on the various estates within the development. Ron Searle, who had the resourcefulness to

A year has now passed, and so photographs and information on all the newly identified fauna and flora are shown in the following pages, under the original Field Guide headings.















conceive of the original Field Guide, was also the driving force behind the update.

Over the past year, our intrepid nature enthusiasts have made some exciting discoveries. A plethora of new plant and animal life has been identified, and you can find all this information and photographs in our digital *Waterfall City Field Guide Update 2024*. Organised under the original Field Guide headings, the update is a treasure trove of new knowledge waiting to be explored.

As we know, weather can have adverse effects on all living things and in the past year, Waterfall City experienced some extreme weather conditions.

On 13 November 2023, a violent and devastating hailstorm caused considerable damage to the green belts, with a large-spotted genet, as well as many bird and insect species, falling victim to the storm. And, despite heavy rainfall in the summer months of '23, rainfall for the entire year was only second highest at 1,004mm of the past 10 year period, positively and negatively affecting our local biodiversity.

Despite this, many new species have been identified, big and small, over the year.

Plants

An astounding 18 additional species of indigenous wildflowers have been discovered. This is all thanks to the tireless efforts of residents Elias and Hildi van Dyk, who have been diligently exploring and documenting the flora on our estates.

Three new species of fungi and a single lichen species were also found. One is the unique-looking Clathrus Transvaalensis, characterised by a cream or pink-coloured receptacle.

Animals

At the time of publication, the Field Guide only showcased the

photographs of 75% of the birds listed. Thanks to resident Ken Logan, photographs of another 36 species, already listed in the guide, are now included in the digital *Waterfall City Field Guide Update 2024*, together with the addition of five entirely new discoveries, bringing our estate bird list to a very impressive 261 species. The five newly discovered birds are the Lesser Flamingo, Verreaux's Eagle, Klaas's Cuckoo, Southern Red-billed Hornbill, usually spotted in the dryer bushlands, and the White-browed Sparrow-weaver.

Insects form a substantial part of our Waterfall City habitat, so it is no surprise that 29 new species have been discovered. Some additions are the Common Metallic Longhorn, the Spotted Maize Beetle, and the unusual Lunate Ladybird (larva depicted).

Moths have also created a stir. The past year has yielded 12 new moths and two new butterfly species.


Spider-wise, the update features two new species and the web of the previously included Hairy Field Spider. These webs are commonly seen in the grass of the green belts in the early mornings, covered in dew. The African Giant Land Snail was also spotted, which is always a great sighting.

The digital Waterfall City Field Guide Update 2024 is now available on the Waterfall City Community Portal for residents to download and print, should they wish to. It has been designed to fit into the printed guide – perfect for reference and safekeeping.





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ALL ABOUT ALOES

loes are a significant and diverse group of plants in South Africa, renowned for their unique aesthetic, ecological, and economic value. They form an important piece of the puzzle regarding the Waterfall City landscape with strategically placed aloes in common areas creating visual appeal, and self-seeding aloes located on the green belts. The unique look and majestic colours of our aloes are a welcome sight in a dormant Gauteng winter.

Here's an in-depth look at these fascinating plants:

Overview


- Genus: Aloe
- Family: Asphodelaceae
- **Distribution:** South Africa boasts a wide variety of aloe species, with some endemic to specific regions.

Species diversity

South Africa is home to around 155 aloe species, making the country a hotspot for aloe diversity.

Habitat

Aloes thrive in various habitats, including arid regions, rocky outcrops, and grasslands. They are particularly well-adapted to drought conditions due to their succulent nature.



Gauteng has wet summers with high humidity, which makes aloes prone to fungal infections and root rot. That is why it is important to maintain aloes with a preventative fungicide spray programme during the summer months to ensure they are healthy and flashy in winter.

We use a broad-spectrum fungicide and bactericide with the active ingredient copper oxychloride. This product can be used as both a preventative and curative aid.

Ecological importance

Pollinators: Aloes are important for pollinators like bees, birds, and

butterflies, especially during the dry season when other flowers are scarce. It is especially beneficial to the green belts in Waterfall City to attract more birds, bees and butterflies to the biodome.

Aloe flowers typically bloom once a year, producing tall stalks with clusters of tubular flowers that range in colour from yellow to red or orange. After the flowering period, the flowers will naturally wither and dry out. The following stages occur:

 Blooming: Aloe plants produce flowers on long stalks, typically during spring or summer, depending on the species and growing conditions.



- Pollination: Flowers can be pollinated by birds, insects, or wind. If pollinated, they may produce seeds.
- Withering: After a few weeks, the flowers will begin to wither and dry out. The stalk will also start to dry up.
- Seed production: If the flowers are pollinated, seed pods might develop.
 These pods will eventually dry out and release seeds.
- Removal: Once the flowers and stalks are completely dry, they can be pruned to maintain appearance and health.
- Regrowth: The aloe plant will continue to grow and may produce new flowers in the next blooming cycle.

Cultural significance

Aloes hold cultural importance in various South African communities, often used in traditional medicine and rituals.

Conservation

While many aloe species are thriving, some are threatened by habitat loss, over-harvesting, and climate change. Conservation efforts include habitat protection, cultivation, and research on sustainable harvesting.

Economic value

Aloe ferox and Aloe vera (though not native) are commercially cultivated for their gel and extracts, used in

cosmetics, pharmaceuticals, and health products. The aloe industry contributes significantly to the local economy through the production and export of aloe-based products.

Aloe research

Institutions like the South African National Biodiversity Institute (SANBI) conduct research on aloe conservation, taxonomy, and sustainable use.

A STORY OF TRIUMPH

over life-threatening burn injuries

escued from a devastating house fire, more than half of Resego Lekgema's tiny body was severely burnt, leaving her fighting for her life for months in the specialised paediatric intensive care unit (PICU) at Netcare Waterfall City Hospital.

Now, after some six months in the hospital, six-year-old Resego is continuing her recovery after being discharged to the Netcare Rehabilitation Hospital and making progress that a few months earlier seemed impossible.

"When Resego was admitted to the PICU at Netcare Waterfall City Hospital in October last year, she had burns covering almost 60% of her total body surface area and 10% inhalation burns inside her lungs," says paediatric intensivist Dr Palesa Monyake.

The little girl was placed on an oscillator machine to support her breathing, and a multidisciplinary team of medical practitioners, including Dr Monyake, a paediatric pulmonologist, paediatric surgeon Dr Vered Lack, and the caring nursing staff, set about the long and painstaking process of treating her burns and fighting the ever-present threat of infection.

"Resego has had a very difficult road, but from the start, she showed incredible tenacity. Her body's immune system was in shock, and she developed sepsis and multi-organ failure, which are unfortunately fairly common with severe burns. Several times, we feared for her life, but somehow, she pulled through," says Dr Monyake.

After five long months in the hospital with her parents and devoted grandmother by her side, Netcare Waterfall City Hospital staff threw a party for Resego to celebrate that she was finally well enough to be discharged for the next stage of her recovery.

"In late February, when she was breathing well and could eat, Resego was transferred to us at Netcare Rehabilitation Hospital," says Professor Andre Mochan, a neurologist who practises at the medical rehabilitation facility.

"After being so ill, Resego's lungs, heart, liver, and other organs were affected, and from being confined to a bed for so long, we needed to help her rebuild her muscles and regain her functioning.

"The burn scars on her face, limbs and trunk also needed to be carefully managed. As scars heal, they contract, making movement difficult and potentially disfiguring if not appropriately addressed," he says.

"Although pain was not a significant feature anymore by this point, Resego

was scared, anxious and irritated after the trauma of her experience and months in intensive care. At first, she was withdrawn and shy, not wanting to talk to anyone, and it wasn't easy to win her trust so we could start some of her therapies.

"Soon, our perseverance was rewarded, and she has become a happy little chatterbox. She's been an absolute angel and the most cheerful child in the ward," says Prof Mochan.

Jessica Erasmus, an occupational

therapist and member of the multidisciplinary healthcare team caring for Resego at Netcare Rehabilitation Hospital, which also includes a dietician, physiotherapists, a social worker, and a psychologist, says that Resego was initially nervous about engaging with her new therapy team.

"My first three days with Resego were primarily aimed at getting a little smile out of her. It wasn't easy to draw her out of her shell, but our dance parties really helped her to open up to us.

"We soon discovered she has a very playful nature; she's constantly engaged and making good progress so far. She's been doing physiotherapy to build her muscles and help keep the scar tissue supple to maximise her range of movement.

"Scarring only matures after two years, and so we have a window of opportunity to make the most of the various therapies, including scar massage and pressure garments to promote healing and the reorganisation of fibres in the scars, keeping them flat and smooth," Erasmus says.

"Splints are also helpful to prevent stricture of the healing scars at the joints, and in Resego's case, her right arm and knee have been splinted in the pressure garments she sleeps in to assist in keeping the scarring at these crucial joints as flexible as possible."


Over time, Resego may require surgeries to release the tight scar tissue as she grows. However, she continues to progress in leaps and bounds.

Resego's mother, Rebaone, expressed her gratitude to all the specialists, nurses and other health practitioners at Netcare Waterfall City and Netcare Rehabilitation Hospitals for everything they have done to help her daughter through the family's ordeal.

"We have been supported with kindness and prayers, and our hearts are full of thanks for Resego's recovery. She is getting better every day, and our prayers have been answered," said the family from Delareyville Atamelang in the Northwest.

"Resego is doing so well. To see how far she has come and knowing all she has been through, it is an absolute miracle to see her smile now," Dr Monyake concludes.

For this reason, it is important to understand how much money you are comfortable keeping in cash and how much to invest in equities.





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How to deal with

BULLYING BEHAVIOUR

ullying is a pandemic. Bullies comes in all shapes and sizes, and sometimes, the act of bullying is so subtle that it is almost impossible for the victim to articulate or pinpoint. It can be physical, psychological or emotional.

But what is bullying exactly? On the surface, it's about children having disagreements or getting into moods and taking this out on a vulnerable child. On a deeper level, it's about a child showing a disturbingly mean streak and going all out to pick on one or more of his or her peers and to then ostracise them by teasing, mocking, humiliating, belittling or physically attacking them.

Why do some children bully others?

Bullying is intentional, repetitive and the result of an imbalance of power. Children who bully are often deeply insecure and need to empower themselves by weakening others. There are often issues at home that leave the child desperate for attention, and they lash out elsewhere instead of at the root of their emotional pain.

Delving deeper, it's often discovered that the bully is or was themself a victim of bullying at some point. It's a distorted way of paying it forward to regain self-esteem.

Ensuring safety at school

The Western Cape Education
Department has established a plan
of action called the Safe Schools
Programme, which works with schools to
ensure safe school environments needed
for successful teaching and learning.
According to a study conducted by Safe
Schools, bullying is rampant in South
African schools with about 3.2 million
children being bullied annually.

When surveyed, children defined bullying as both verbal and physical abuse, and more than 67% of children who had been bullied did not seek help from an adult because they didn't believe it would do any good or they

feared that reporting it could make the situation worse. In South Africa, there is a lot of pressure on children and adults not to be labelled a "snitch", hence the apathy shown by our society towards whistleblowers.

Interestingly, only 4% of kids surveyed said that they knew someone who had been bullied. This is because bullies can be subtle and often ensure that their actions are not seen, or when they are in public, their bullying behaviour is disguised as horseplay and the victim is too embarrassed to speak out, often chuckling along just to fit in.

Twenty years ago, if a child was being bullied at school, going home at the end of the school day was a reprieve. But in today's world, the bully follows the child into the sanctity of their private space, thanks to social media. Incidents of cyberbullying are on the rise and unfortunately, legislation has lagged when it comes to seeking legal recourse.

Even with the introduction of the Cybercrimes Act – which aims to reduce and prevent cybercrime in South Africa – it is difficult to avoid cyberbullying and to seek help.

Consequences of bullying

The effects of bullying on the victim's emotional and mental health are far-reaching. The victim can lose their self-esteem and spiral into a state of depression and anxiety. This leads to further consequences such as substance abuse, self-mutilation, or even suicide. Sometimes the victim is forced to move to a different school to escape the constant humiliation.

Signs your child is being bullied

Children often suffer in silence, and some parents put their child's self-isolation or moodiness down to hormones, teenage angst or a phase they are going through. It is essential that you as a parent encourage open and honest communication with your child and make this a normal part of the family dynamic.

If your child is uncharacteristically bad-tempered, avoids school, avoids discussing school or shows a dramatic shift in their academic performance, it is cause for concern. Physical signs such as cuts or bruises, unexplained damage, or the loss of their belongings are also red flags.

What to do when your child is being bullied

The most important thing you can do is listen and let your child feel heard. Personalise it by sharing your own experiences if you were bullied as a child, but be careful not to undermine their experience by implying that it is normal behaviour that every child needs to deal with.

Speak to your child's teacher and seek guidance, but don't confront the bully or the bully's parents. It is natural for parents to be defensive and protect their children, but this will not fix anything.

You must also seek the necessary support for your child and yourself so as to equip them with the tools they need to handle the situation. Counselling is highly recommended.

It's important that you help your child articulate what is happening to them. How you do this will depend on their age. Methods include getting the child to draw and describe their pictures

or going for a milkshake and having a good talk.

Look at where your child is thriving and consider the subjects or activities that interest them. If they have a hobby they're passionate about or if they are involved in a favourite sport, help them use this as a channel for positivity and affirmation.

Equip your child with knowledge about the dangers of the online world – it's similar to warning them about stranger danger. Help them to navigate social media in a responsible way and be sure to take an interest in their online life. This can be tough when you have older teens; the solution is to keep a healthy channel of communication wide open.

The internet is ruthless – once something is out there, there is no taking it back. Children need to realise this, and they should never say or post anything online that they wouldn't share in person.

If your child is being taunted or bullied online – be it by someone they know or a stranger – understand that they need to feel safe in order to speak up about it. This means that you as a parent need to be open-minded. Never retaliate by belittling the child's enjoyment of online gaming or social media. It is part of their world, and they must learn to navigate it safely.

If you suspect or discover that your child is bullying another child, it is just as important to seek expert help and support. It's about getting to the root of the problem so that it doesn't become a long-term issue. Also, it's important for you to assure your child that you love them unconditionally and to guide them on how to go about setting matters right with the people they've bullied.
